- Phonics: R.W.I programme
- High quality texts used in English lessons and across the curriculum
- Accelerated Reader (after graduated from RWI)
- DERIC X 2 weekly
- 1:1 reading with an adult when possible
- Phonics interventions
- Class stories

Homework - Reading

- Children have been given a Reading record each, which may include their RWI books or an AR book – please ensure these are in school everyday. (Appropriate bag)
- Your child will learn HOW to read during Phonics and Guided reading sessions in class.
- These skills will then be practiced at home little and often, (10 mins daily is a good aim). We want children to enjoy reading and sharing books with you!
- Reading Record Please sign your child's record daily to celebrate the reading that it taking place at home. Please indicate which page is next or if the book is finished so we can remind them to change their book; You may want to note any success and/or difficulties.

Homework - Reading

- We check the children's reading records daily. If you have any questions or comments regarding reading, please do record them here and we will get back to you as quickly as possible.
- We will be endeavour to tick/answer your comment (in pink pen) daily to show that we have seen it.
- When they have finished an AR book, children will take a quiz to check their understanding.
- Changing of books: children can change their books any day, once they have finished reading their book.

Spelling



- •Lots of children (and adults!) find spelling tricky because English is a real melting pot of languages.
- •Modern English is based on a least forty sounds but the alphabet has only twenty-six letters.
- •A lot of the English language is no longer phonetic in spelling. This means that in many cases that which is written is not what is said. Pronunciations have significantly changed over the centuries, while spellings have not kept up or have not changed at all.
- •The spelling of knight, for example, reflects the way that it was spoken centuries ago when there were almost no "silent letters."

Apart from homework, activities to practice Maths at home:

- For fluency: Practice regularly with your child:
 - counting (forwards and especially backwards) in 1s, 2s, 5s, 10s
 - number facts within 20 (see table on the next slide)
- Play board games (any games with dice)
- Counting money with different coins
- Telling the time
 - o'clock, half past (Y1),
 - quarter past, quarter to and in 5-minute intervals (Y2)
- Sharing food into equal parts (division and fraction: halves, quarters, thirds)
- Cooking, measuring, reading measurements

Literacy

Reading:

Phonics and decoding. Children will learn different spellings (graphemes) of the same sound (phoneme) (e.g. the /ee/ sound can be spelt ee, gg, gy, or y). Children will also learn to read multisyllable words.

Comprehension: Children will learn to retrieve and recall information from a text. They learn to explain the meaning of words in contexts and to order a sequence of events in a narrative.

Writing:

The Place Value of Punctuation and Grammar – Nouns, verbs and single clause sentences. Non-chronological reports based on dragons Narrative based on Jack and the Beanstalk

Class Books: Six dinner Sid, Sharing a shell and a variety of traditional stories.

Science

- Identify and name everyday materials, knowing the difference between an object and the material it is made of.
- Describe simple physical properties of a range of everyday materials.
- Compare and group materials on the basis of the simple physical properties.
- Carry out investigations on materials using scientific methods and skills.
- Identify and compare the suitability of a range of everyday materials for particular uses.
- Investigate how materials change shape.
- Observe and describe weather associated with the seasons and how day length varies across 4 seasons.

Maths

- Read and write numbers to 20 (Y1) and to 100 (Y2).
- Count, compare, order 1 and 2digit numbers, including placing them on a blank number line
- Represent and partition numbers in different ways.
- Add and subtract numbers:
- 1 digit and 1 digit (including adding 3 single digit numbers)
- 2 digit and 1 digit numbers
- 2 digit and multiples of 10
- 2 digit and 2 digit numbers
- Solve problems involving numbers, place value, addition and subtraction.

Other curriculum areas

<u>History</u>: Learn about The Great Fire of London using different sources. How does the event effect the way houses are built designs today?

Geography: Local area - Where do we live?

Art/DT: Creatively design and make a Tudor house using a range of materials. Evaluate and develop practical and artistic techniques.

Drawing skills. Draw lines and shapes. Explore spirals. Mix and blend colours.

<u>ICT:</u> Internet safety: Use technology safely and respectfully. Children learn to recognise technology around us and how to use a computer responsibly.

<u>Music:</u> Explore Old Style Hip-hop and Reggae music. Learn how pulse, rhythm and pitch work together. Learn to sing Christmas songs.

RE: Who is Muslim and how do they live?
Why does Christmas matter to Christians?
